This source, written for a contemporary Catholic chronicle ^{chronicle} puts forward the notion that the harsh ways of EVI enforcement of the religious changes to reform the church can suggest opposes widespread opposition.</p> <p>When EVI began his religious changes, the 1547 attack on Catholicism was an extremely sudden and dramatic attack which can be described in this source as "on the 15th of September 1547 began the king's visitation at St Pauls and all the images were pulled down" which denotes the severity of the attack, the intensity of opposition towards this is hinted to be extremely strong in this source as before 1547, Henry VIII had a prominent Catholic role which juxtaposes these removals and attacks</p>
